Thurstaston Thor's Rock

The rock has been the subject of much mystery and fascination for many generations, reached by following winding footpaths through woodland.

The rock is around 30 feet high and can be acended via a series of eroded channels.

The softness of the sandstone is revealed by the numerous visitors who have carved their names into the soft red rock. Visit it to see for yourself!



2 Royden Park

A vast area of woodland and open spaces, perfect for a country walk any time of the year. Family and dog friendly, with many different trials as well as a miniature railway for adventures through the park.

6 West Kirby Marine Lake

Enjoy breathtaking views of the North Wales skyline whislt walking along a unique pathway that extends into the River Dee estuary. The walk takes 30 minutes and there are numerous cafes to visit for a drink afterwards.



9 Birkenhead

Hamilton Square is a compact district of Birkenhead, featuring the most Grade 1 Listed Buildings outside the capital. Enjoy a stroll through the grounds just 5 minutes walk from Woodside Ferry Port.

7 Parkgate

Further down the south-west coast of Wirral, this coastal town features a stretch of road peppered with cafes and a famous ice cream shop.

10 Bidston Hill

One of the highest points of the Wirral, Bidston Hill offers views to Liverpool and a series of trails.

Underneath the terrain is a legacy of underground tunnels that formerly provided shelter during World War 2.



Port Sunlight village

Lord Leverhulme – a pioneering
entrepreneur who built houses for
workers at his soap factory which
evolved to become Unilever.
The historic village is home to a
theatre, museum, art gallery, and
garden centre. Also with its own

8 Heswall
